Each competitor must wear, **BACK AND FRONT**, the number and the letter shown in this programme.

News of the World arrow signs will be shown throughout the Course at all turns, and banners show each take-over.

1959 NATIONAL RACE (LONDON TO BRIGHTON)

Devastating Win In Our Relay

Reprinted from the "NEWS OF THE WORLD" April 12th, 1959.

DERBY and County A.C. won well and truly in the "News of the World" London to Brighton National road relay race yesterday. Breaking away on the fourth of the 12 stages, they were never afterwards headed and, clocking 4hr. 40min. 21sec., scored their first-ever success in this race.

They beat South London Harriers by 75 sec. with Thames Valley Harriers (the holders) third and Portsmouth A.C. fourth.

While Derby completely dominated, and at times were simply devastating, the duel for the other positions among the first six produced one of the most thrilling London to Brighton events I have ever seen.

With torrential rain falling for most of the race and the runners also fighting against a bitterly cold head wind, it was understandable that neither full course nor intermediate records were approached.

Hero Heatley

First signs of Derby's success were seen when Peter Wilkinson brought them from sixth to second position on the third stage of 5 miles, 1,416 yards. Yet hero of this leg was Basil Heatley, who, clocking the fastest time of 28min. 17sec., took Coventry Godiva from 10th to first place.

Derby's Joe Keily proved to be the key man on the next stage. He put his club into the lead and they never looked back.

With 20 of the 55 miles, 1,060 yards covered, the desperate battle for the place positions really got under way. Fighting with every painful stride were Polytechnic, Thames Valley, Portsmouth, Birchfield and Coventry.

Then came a dramatic change South London Harriers, who had been trailing in 8th and 10th position, now came within striking distance of the bunched contenders. This was when Laurie Reed on the 8th stage took them into second place.

Mick Firth dropped back five places on the following leg, but Peter Driver ran one of his best ever races over the 10th stage between Hickstead and Dale Hill.

Driver brought them into fourth place from seventh place, and Derek Ibbotson carried on the good work with another fastest-of-the-day runs. This really consolidated South London's second placing.

Success Secret

Secret of Derby's success was their supreme all-round team strength. Their best men included Alan Taylor and Mike Bullivant.

One of the most exciting efforts came over the last stage, in which the fastest time of 17 min. 28 sec. was recorded by Thames Valley's Derek Haith. He brought his club up from seventh to third place.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPETITORS AND OFFICIALS

A letter from the Rt. Hon. Sir Ian A. Johnson-Gilbert, C.B.E., LL.D., Lord Provost of Edinburgh, addressed to the Rt. Hon. Myer Galpern, M.P., Lord Provost of Glasgow, will be handed to the first representative of Bellahouston H., (last year's winners) at the start by Bailie Graeme H. Menzies of Edinburgh, and will be delivered to the Lord Provost of Glasgow's deputy, Bailie John Mathieson, at the winning post.

All teams will carry a baton throughout the race.

Any team falling 30 minutes behind the leading team will be taken out of the race.

Competitors' coaches, numbered as per relays 1-8, will take runners to their respective starting points, and pick them up again at the end of their relays. All competitors *must* travel in the official coaches.

All competitors, except those running the first relay, must be in their respective coaches, ready to start at 11.0 a.m. No competitor will be waited for. Only competitors and officials with Coach Tickets will be allowed to travel in the coaches.

To avoid congestion, no coaches must stop within 100 yards beyond each Take-over. Coach drivers are asked by the Organisers to observe this request strictly.

The first ten teams to finish will qualify for next year's race. The remaining teams to be invited will be selected by the Scottish A.A.A. and S.N.C.C.U.
