DERBY CARRY OFF RELAY HAT-TRICK

THEY did it! Derby and County A.C. pulled off their third consecutive victory in the News of the World London to Brighton National road relay race yesterday. Their team of 12 runners covered the 55 miles 1,060 yards in 4 hr. 29 min. 15 sec. Portsmouth were second, 32 sec. behind, Coventry Godiva third and South London Harriers fourth.

This was the greatest of all post-war relays. Records were shattered on every side. Outstanding individual performance was set up by the Olympic runner Martin Hyman of Portsmouth A.C.

Right from the start we had a record: Ken Wood, Sheffield's forgotten man of athletics—came back in devastating style to clip 2 sec. off the first stage figures of 20 min. 12 sec. for the four and a quarter miles which Ian Boyd set up five years ago.

At this stage, Derby were lying eighth. Then, Dominic Keilly, one of the six famous athletics brothers, raced away to take the Derby club to the front.

Eyebrows were raised when Coventry put International cross-country champion Basil Heatley on the third stage from Mitcham to Purley, a distance of five miles, 138 yards.

Usually, the "big guns" are brought in later in the race, but Coventry knew what they were doing—and so did Basil. He took them from ninth to first place, clocking 27 min. 24 sec. to put up a new intermediate record. Also inside the old figures of 27 min. 41 sec. were Brian Craig (Blackpool) and John Herring (Blackheath).

With Derby in command again at the end of the fourth stage, Portsmouth were brought into the picture by Tom Hayden, who took them into third position at the end of the fifth leg.

Hyman's great effort came on the eighth stage, a tough undulating six miles, 264 yards. He took over 40 sec. behind Derby's Peter Wilkinson and handed over with a 71 sec. lead. He smashed his own record for this stage by 34 sec.

Bruce Tulloh, suffering with a swollen ankle, was not at his best for Portsmouth. This was Derby's chance, and they grasped it unmercifully. Mike Bullivant cut Pompey's lead over the next stage to a mere 15 seconds and then on the 10th leg, Mike Deakin put Derby back in front again. They stayed there for the rest of the race, but how those Portsmouth boys chased them!

Blackpool and Fylde A.C. were awarded the medals for the most meritorious performance.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPETITORS AND OFFICIALS

A letter from the Rt. Hon. J. Greig Dunbar, Lord Provost of Edinburgh, addressed to the Rt. Hon. Mrs. Jean Roberts, Lord Provost of Glasgow, will be handed to the first representative of Shettleston H., (last year's winners) at the start by Bailie T. A. W. MacPherson of Edinburgh, and will be delivered to the Lord Provost of Glasgow's deputy, Bailie David W. Gibson at the winning post.

All teams will carry a baton throughout the race. (i.e. in the hand)

Any team falling 30 minutes behind the leading team will be taken out of the race.

Competitors' coaches, numbered as per relays 1-8, will take runners to their respective starting points, and pick them up again at the end of their relays. All competitors *must* travel in the official coaches.

All competitors, except those running the first relay, must be in their respective coaches, ready to start at 11.0 a.m. No competitor will be waited for. Only competitors and officials with Coach Tickets will be allowed to travel in the coaches.

To avoid congestion, no coaches must stop within 100 yards of each Take-Over. Coach drivers are asked by the Organisers to observe this request strictly.

The first ten teams to finish will qualify for next year's race. The remaining teams to be invited will be selected by the Scottish A.A.A. and S.N.C.C.U.
