M'Morran fourth, R. B. M'Intyre fifth, T. Whitton (Eastern District Champion) sixth, P. Nicol (Kilmarnock) seventh, J. Girvan (Garscube) eighth, D. Quinn (Garscube) ninth, J. M'Intyre (Garscube) tenth, R. Henderson (Glasgow Harriers) eleventh, and H. Rourke twelfth.

Garscube Harriers, as was expected, won the team contest with plenty to spare. This is the first occasion on which they have succeeded in this event, and A. J. T. M'Morran, who led their team home, is a much improved athlete. M'Turk, the veteran, played no small part in his team's success.
